Brian D. McLaren will be teaching and preaching at Cherry Log Christian Church on Sunday, November 11th. Brian is an author, speaker, activist, and public theologian. A former college English teacher and pastor, he is an ecumenical global networker among innovative Christian leaders.

Brian has been active in networking and mentoring church planters and pastors since the mid 1980's, and has assisted in the development of several new churches. He is a popular conference speaker and a frequent guest lecturer for denominational and ecumenical leadership gatherings - across the US and Canada, Latin America, Europe, Africa, and Asia.

He is primarily known, however, as a thinker and writer. His first book, *The Church on the Other Side: Doing Ministry in the Postmodern Matrix*, has been recognized as a primary portal into the current conversation about postmodern ministry. His second book, *Finding Faith*, is a contemporary apologetic, written for thoughtful seekers and skeptics.

Brian's recent book, Why Did Jesus, Moses, the Buddha, and Mohammed Cross the Road? (Christian Identity in a Multi-Faith World) is the premier release of Jericho Books. It explores the intersection of religious identity, inter-religious hostility, and human solidarity.

During Sunday school you will be able to ask Brian questions and hearing his proclamation in church.



Thanksgiving Is A Warm Blanket

What are you thankful for? You might not think to list the blessing of snuggling into bed, under comforter and quilt, in your warm home these chilly North Georgia nights. For countless thousands whose lives are disrupted by natural and manmade disasters, thanksgiving often comes in the form of a warm blanket. We at Cherry Log have the opportunity, each November, of expressing our own gratitude by giving blankets through Church World Service. \$5 will send a blanket; \$25 will provide for a family left homeless by a disaster. These blankets serve as tents, suitcases, coats, carpets, curtains, cover. Last year Cherry Log sent 159 blankets!

Blankets in the first half of 2012 went to 15 states here in our own country. As few as 25 to a homeless shelter in New Jersey,

and as many as 1,020 to Moundsville, WVA in response to severe storms. Many more went to Pakistan's people after floods, to Haiti after storms, and all around the globe.

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A Stewardship Moment

Last month, we conducted our annual Stewardship Drive. Our campaign is over, but our stewardship continues. The purpose of this drive was varied: Most importantly it is a process to allow each of us to make a financial commitment for the next year. This process is part of our Christian heritage. It signifies our relationship with God as we follow his words to give back to our community. Secondly, it is a tool the Finance Committee can use as we establish our operating budget for the next year. To date, we have had 62 pledge cards returned for a total of \$209,000. Since many people were not present during the commitment Sunday, we do expect more to come in over the next weeks. For those who have not yet submitted a pledge, we encourage you to do so. You can place it in the offering plate any Sunday, or you can forward it to the church office. The positive results so far are that approximately 20 pledges were submitted from those who had not submitted one previously. For that we say Thank You. I hope you experience joy each week as you honor that pledge.

We are currently working with all of the committees to determine their needs and establish a budget for next year. The bad news is that our current commitments will cover only approximately ½ of our anticipated needs. If that occurs, we have several choices: 1) proceed with faith and pray that more people will continue to give without a pledge, 2) ask each to give more, or 3) cut our expenses to reflect only what is pledged—this is not a viable option as it is a going out of business plan. With all of the good things we at Cherry Log Christian Church are doing, I know you join me in a prayerful journey of faith as we continue with our ministry efforts. There will be more information on the 2013 budget in next months Cherrylogue.

We placed the Fruit of the Spirit tree in the playground area. Each time you drive into or out of our parking lot, look over at this tree. It is a symbol of our ongoing efforts as we provide our ministry to the community and help to change people's lives. Each time you look at it, think about what you are doing and what you could be doing with your time, your talents and your financial gifts.

CLCC Listening Team Update

The CLCC Listening Team was formed earlier this year by the Elders to work with the University of Georgia's Fanning Institute to design and execute an interview with the objective of defining the perspectives, hopes, and concerns of the congregation; develop a report of findings; and recommend next steps based on the findings. In August, 122 congregation members completed a survey. In September, representatives from the Fanning Institute conducted two focus groups with the objective of learning more about key themes that surfaced from the survey input. Anyone who wanted to participate was allowed to join the focus groups. Approximately 39 people participated.

The initial draft of findings has been compiled. The Listening Team is in the process of scheduling a meeting with the Fanning Institute to explore the findings, have questions answered, and ensure understanding of the information in the draft. Once the information is understood, the Listening Team will provide the congregation with a report and make recommendations to the Elders and Board.



Belle Doss Continues to Serve at UGA

Belle Doss has taken on a mission at UGA and she needs our help. Belle is a member of the UGA HEROs team. HEROs raises money to support H.E.R.O. for Children, the only non-profit organization in Georgia solely focusing on providing quality of life care to children affected by HIV/AIDS.

Georgia has the 2nd highest rate of pediatric AIDS Cases in the United States. More than 12,000 children are affected by HIV/AIDS in Georgia alone. Belle and the UGA HEROs help raise money to send these children to Camp High Five. The camp gives the children a chance to be kids by helping them escape the stigma of HIV/AIDS with a week of emotional support and recreational fun. With your support, UGA HEROs hope to send 100 kids to camp next summer!

Spiritual Practices for Todays Disciples A Peace Walk

(This month's column is our third article in a series of four lessons on walking prayer.)

When one talks about Christian Spirituality, many people automatically equate this focus with personal inward piety. In reality, this is only one part of the story. The Christian life is about both in the inward journey of faith and the outward journey of service. They cannot be separated; they are two sides of the same coin. Christian spiritual practices/disciplines include both movements. Sometimes one practice might even encompass both at the same time. So it is with this month's featured type of walking prayer.

The practice of a peace walk is not a new idea or one that is limited to the Christian faith. Like our other practices, it begins with a focus or intention. It is typically different from a protest march in that participants do not carry signs or enter into confrontation (peaceful or otherwise).

So, how do you engage in the spiritual practice of a peace walk? While you can do this alone, why not ask at least a handful of like-minded people to join you. What issue of justice or longing for peace pulls at your heart? Set a time and place to meet your group. Publicize and invite others if you wish. (If you have a large group, remember to get a permit.) Map out and plan your route ahead of time (about 1 mile). Consider if you want to pass out a flyer if people wonder what you are doing. Meet at your designated time and location. Begin with a spoken or silent prayer, the reading of names or the telling of a few stories. Articulate aloud to those gathered- the hope/hope/prayer/intention for your walk. After that sometimes people light candles, all wear the same shirt or wear a specific color. Then begin to walk at a slow, measured pace. Your walk should be reverent and your attitude humble. Consider praying silently while you walk. Greet others you encounter with a friendly nod or smile. When you complete your prayer walk, close with a silent or spoken prayer. Your prayer is your walk. The witness is your prayer. And your faithfulness is the discipline.

FROM MY HEART....TO YOUR HEART

I do not remember what we were discussing. Our friendship was well worn, meaning we had gone through good and bad times together. Our discussions were mostly meaningful; some were eccentric. We cared enough for each other that our arguments would not a detriment, our differences were not insurmountable, and our pet peeves were honored as laughable.

My friend stopped our discussion with a time out. "You are comparing apples with oranges. You cannot do that! Please compare apples to apples and oranges to oranges." We had been on that train track before. My response was sort of, "Who said that? Quote me a reference." Not trying to laugh, he responded, "It is common knowledge. It belongs to the wealth of humanity." So off we went into hysterics, bantering each other with clichés.

But finally I came back to the point. "Apples and oranges both have seeds, grow on trees, the peel is healthy to eat, and both contain valuable vitamins. You know, just because they are different does not mean that they are not the same." (My dear friend also pointed out the double negatives!)

Twelfth century Rhineland mystic Hildegard of Bingen wrote that God has arranged everything in the universe in consideration of everything else. Note that Hildegard did not say "in judgment" or "in rank of importance". The "consideration" is not inferior to one and superior to the other. Each part is in consideration of everything else.

Brain Swimme says it well, "Nothing is itself without everything else." We are participants in one another's lives at every level of being. Return to my nature image and think about nature's participation: soft woods and hard wood, water and dry land, hills and level places. One helps define the other, or participates in the life of other. The same is true for humanity.


The church is the body of Christ. Maybe it would be helpful to review I Corinthians 12 where Paul is writing to the church and using our gifts for the building up of the church. The church needs every eye, toe, ear, and nose and none is inferior to the other.

We are entering a difficult time in the life of our nation. I feel that the closer we are to the elections, the more divided we will become. I am also fearful of the results of the election. This is not said because of one candidate or the other for president, but the response that we might make having "won or lost" the election. Besides, winning and losing might not decided at the ballot box but in our response and support of our values.

And this holds true for church.

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Hospitality & Welcome at CLCC

One of the frequent things said about Cherry Log Christian Church is that we are a "friendly church." Many visitors and guests comment on how welcome they felt when they attended one of our worship services or church events. All of us can remember when we first visited Cherry Log Christian Church. Who made you feel welcome?

In the next 3 months, many people will be visiting our church. Studies say that November is one of the busiest times for people to begin to look for a church. Couples, families, and single people are getting ready for the holidays and looking for a church home or a church to which they feel comfortable bringing any visiting family or friends. So how can you welcome visiting guests to our church?

Introduce yourself by saying your name and using a phrase like, "I don't believe I've had the chance to meet you before." Sometimes as members, we forget each other's names (nametags are helpful) or we are hesitant to welcome someone because we are afraid the person may be a member of the church and not a visitor or guest.

Get to know a guest for the sake of getting to know the guest. This is not about pouncing on visitors in the hunt for new volunteers. This is about being authentically interested in God's children. After your initial introduction, authentically try to find out three things about this new person.

Create a culture of inclusion and invitation. If you and a small group of people are going to brunch after worship, seek out someone who seems to be new or alone or really hungry and invite that person to come along. Church is not a private club. We are a community of people grappling together with issues of faith and life and new people also like to grapple.

Meet people in the parking lot with smiles (and umbrellas, if it's raining) and walk them into the building. Make sure they have what they need: a coat hanger, a bulletin or program.

If and when the person or couple returns wave hello or call him by name. Tell him how nice it is to see him again.

So keep your eyes open and take a chance on meeting someone you don't know. You'll have the opportunity to speak to a visiting guest or perhaps greet a member of CLCC whom you haven't yet met. Who knows...it might be the beginning of a great friendship.

August 14th, it was about 4:45 AM when Doyle's cell phone started ringing. Everyone knows the fear of those unusual calls that wake you from sleeping. Immediately you know something is wrong. I sat up in the bed and tried to overhear the conversation. It was my daughter Amber. For those of you who do not know Amber, she is nothing like me. I cry at a good commercial. I do not know if Amber even has tear ducts. She is one tough cookie, a trait I admire and one I morn.

"Dad, what are you doing?" she asked. "Amber it's the middle of the night I was sleeping what's wrong?" Doyle replied. "Well the kids and I are sitting in my van naked watching our house burn and I was just wondering if you and Mom could bring us some clothes." My feet immediately hit the floor Doyle is asking about the kids I am grabbing clothes and shoes and within in minutes we were out the door and headed across town.

As we approached the hill in front of Fannin Regional Hospital, I could see the night sky lit up where I knew her house stood. As we got closer, the flames became brighter and my heart began to sink deeper. We pulled into the driveway and while the car was still rolling I jumped out as we approached the van. Baylor 5, Emma 4, and Archer 2, all crying could not get to Meme and Pop fast enough. I do not really remember what I said. I looked at the house engulfed in the flames and just counted my kids over and over again. Everyone was out. The paramedics came to check out the kids and they would not let us go. "Pop let's just go to your house Baylor cried."

Doyle and I put the kids in the car ... Baylor up front with his pop and me in the back with Archer and Emma in my lap. No car seat...I could not let them go. When we got back to our house, we went straight to our room laid all three kids in the bed with us. We talked about the dogs and that they were fine. Doyle reassured Emma he could build her a new Toy Box, and told Baylor we could buy new transformers. Baylor told us how he helped Archer get out of the house while Daddy tried to wake mama up. Archer lay on his papa's chest and eventually the three of them finally feel to sleep. I held Doyle's hand as I cried and prayed thanking God my babies were safe.

As of October 19th Amber and Jeremy and their four kids are settling into a new home. An adjacent property was going through a foreclosure and they were able to reach an agreement. The house needs many repairs but in time, it will be a beautiful place to call home. Many of the repairs to get the inside livable were possible by the gifts given from you. Thank you for your kindness and generosity.

One may call it one of Gods gentle reminders of what is truly important in our lives. A nudge that awakens our hearts to see what can be replaced and what is truly valuable. It is not possessions that make us rich: it is the gift of those we love and whom love us. That is how we truly measure our value.
