On October 28, we had a fabulous party at Tower Road – our Trunk-or-Treat! Ten families from CLCC brought trunks filled with goodies (and toothbrushes!). The Story Express was present, with Ms. Trisha distributing books. Apples were on hand (courtesy of Mercier's), topped with warm homemade caramel. The kids played games, were tattooed, had their faces painted, and some watched *It's The Great Pumpkin, Charlie Brown*. Everyone had a blast! Most importantly, we received requests for coats and shoes for 173 young people.

We were amazed at the turnout - 173! Fortunately, through God's blessings, shown also through your generosity, we had enough resources to fill all of these requests. A very large number of gently used coats were received courtesy of an unexpected donor. Over half of the shoes we received were brand new croc-style shoes, donated from Family Life Ministries in East Point. The rest came from you – donations of coats, shoes, clothing, and money, which we used to purchase items that were requested in sizes that weren't donated. In a week's time, we filled enormous bags with the items ordered by each family, and on November 4, we returned to Tower Road to deliver the goods.

Every family kept and returned their ticket (which was how we identified orders) to claim their bag. We even had two children request items the day we delivered, and fortunately we had extras in their sizes on hand. All in, 175 young people were served through this project, and will now be a bit warmer this winter. For this we are truly grateful, and we thank you for your support.

ADVENT REMEMBERING THE FIRST CHRISTMAS... AND MAKING THIS CHRISTMAS MEANINGFUL

The term "advent" comes from the Latin *adventus*, meaning "coming" or "appearance." Advent is the season marking the four Sundays before Christmas and developed as a way of helping Christians prepare not only to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ in his First Coming, but also to help them look forward to the coming of Jesus now in our lives. There are wonderful ways to find meaning in Christmas through

the traditions of the church's celebration of Christmas.

Many Advent traditions come from Germany, where Martin Luther encouraged its continued observance as a way of teaching children and families more about the significance of the coming of Jesus Christ.

Advent is a time of joyful anticipation of the realization of God's promise. It is a grace-filled season of new hope, new life, and new love. There is a sense of urgency in Advent that wakes us up from our complacency. Advent should challenge us to prepare our world and ourselves for the coming of the kingdom of peace and justice.

As we prepare to exchange gifts with our loved ones, we must also prepare ourselves for the true gift of God's love. Do we accept God's gift with gratitude? Do we proclaim the good news to others? Are we becoming more ADVENTurous by being more joyful, hopeful, faithful lovers of God, others, and ourselves? Are we watching and preparing for Christ's coming now and at the end of time? The preface for Advent reminds us to "Watch for the day" so that our hearts may be "filled with wonder and praise" when the Lord comes. Those who are alert to his appearance every day will only recognize Christ's coming. May this season of Emmanuel fill you with the Lord's abiding presence.

Stewardship Moment

This is one of those "Good News/Bad News" stories. The good news is we have completed our most responsive Stewardship Campaign ever. To date, we have 74 pledges for a total of \$ 234,000 committed for next year. And, we still have many active members who have not yet pledged. The bad news is that overall giving has dropped dramatically in the last two months. The decline has been over \$10,000 a month. This has placed us in a very precarious position of barely being able to make our expense payments. These two situations seem to be at such opposite perspectives that our committee is confused.

While this is going on, we are trying to put together a budget for the next year. We know we will have increased expenses to maintain our various properties and facilities. If we want to continue to make a difference we cannot cut back on our ministry efforts. The finance committee is working with all of the other committees to determine their needs as the best as we can project. The board voted on the new budget on November 17th and the congregation will vote on it on December 2nd. Know that we are doing our best to make this the most realistic projection of our costs to operate our church efforts. We ask your continued prayers and support to restore our weekly giving so we can make a difference.

Our proposed budget for next year will require faith that our level of giving will increase. If each of us participates, I am confident we will continue to make a difference in people's lives. Any extra gifts will make a big difference over the next several months.

Wednesday Morning Group Invites You

We have two Bible study groups that meet at 10 am on Wednesdays. One is for Men (in fellowship hall) and the other for Women (in adult classroom) of CLCC. We are currently combining our groups at 10:30 to study the scriptures together. We recently started a study of the Gospel of Matthew, with an online resource called "28 Days with Matthew," by Don Tingle, the brother of our own Rev. Jim Tingle. Don is a missionary in Kosovo. The little book is an introduction to Matthew in daily readings of one chapter in the gospel. We are sharing 2 of these chapters per week with round-table discussion. We invite new members to join our fellowship/study group on Wednesdays.

Faith in Fiction Book Group

D. H. Lawrence's <u>The Plumed Serpent</u> is the topic for the next meeting of the CLCC book group, Faith in Fiction. It is the third novel in a trio of novels set south of the border. This one deals with a contrived religion and will likely be fodder for an in-depth discussion of the elements of religion and religious experience. This meeting moves to the second Friday for the month of December only, December 14, at 11:30; bring a brown bag lunch.

In January, 2013, we will resume meetings on first Fridays with the first title, <u>Lambs of God</u>, by Marele Day, an Australian author, about a convent on a distant island that has only a few nuns left. They have been alone long enough that they have developed their own combo of Christianity, paganism, and witchcraft.

This book group welcomes anyone who wants to read and discuss books.

Adult Education: We have a lot going on for the next several months.

In the beginning of the year, Dr. Craddock will teach a series of lessons on "Confessions of Faith in the New Testament". This should give us a good look at the theology of the early church and how it developed.

AFTER Dr. Craddock's class, we will begin a study of the Gospel of Luke. We are intentionally trying to do more "Bible study" for those who might like more in depth reading and study of certain books. Our text book for the study of Luke will be Dr. Craddock's treatise on Luke.

Our Wednesday night dinners will start again on January 16th. Dr. Griffin will lead us in discussing the book, *Falling Upward: A Spirituality for the Two Halves of Life* by Richard Rohr.

FROM MY HEART....TO YOUR HEART

Do you remember the quote about the best laid plans? Robert Burns wrote that "the best laid plans of mice and men often go astray." I keep that in my mind when I officiate at weddings. People are anxious, excited, nervous, or upset. They can forget no matter how long the rehearsal is or how many hours go into the planning of a wedding

I remember one wedding where a three-year old was nephew of the bride. The bride often kept the little boy, whom I will name Danny. Danny's feelings had been hurt that he was not included in the service. As the wedding party processed in, Danny rushed to help the flower girl scatter the petals. There was only a minor scuffle. Just before the bride was to enter, candles were lit in the archway, and the young man who lit the candles graciously allowed Danny to help him light the candles. Danny took his seat; the bride came in and was blessed by her father and mother. As I read the scripture from 1 Corinthians 13, Danny came up and stood between the coupe and me, looking up at the three of us.

After the scripture, I laid my book aside and picked up this precious little boy. I said to the Danny that I had some things I wanted to say to the couple and I would like for him to hear what I was saying, for he, like all of us, needed to learn about marriage and for those of us older, needed to be reminded about marriage. Danny listened to my words. When I spoke to the bride and groom individually, he held the hand of the bride and patted the groom on the shoulder.

I then explained to Danny that I was going to ask the bride and groom to make promises to each other and also to God. I asked Danny if he could join his mother and let Sarah and Bob make these holy promises. His eyes grew wide, "They are going to talk to God?" I affirmed that and asked if he could join his mother and eavesdrop on their conversation. He slipped from my arms and joined his mother. He then prayerfully bowed his head.

All Danny wanted was to be included. Children do what we want to do but are too polite to do. He wanted to participate, to understand, to ask questions, and to be involved in something that was meaningful.

In Advent I would like to ask you to be like Danny. I would like for you to read the Advent texts, to ask questions, be involved, to make a place for your own self in the birth narrative. During the season of Advent I am going to focus on the first chapter of Luke. We will be longing with an older couple for a child and celebrate the joy of Elizabeth and Zechariah in the birth of their son, John. We will feel the wonder and amazement of a younger and inexperienced couple who will be parents to God's wonder of love to humanity. I often wonder why God did not use the older, experienced couple to be the parents of Jesus and the younger couple to have the rebel son to make way announce the coming of the Messiah.

Advent at Cherry Log is a time that we open our child-like wonder to the mystery of God. Can you imagine what it was like when Danny went to the Christmas Eve Service? That is another story! I do wish, however, that in each of our Advent worships and experiences you will open your hearts to the experience of God's love.

New Disciple Bible Group Starting:

Do you want to learn more about the Bible and what it can say to our lives today?

Do you want to meet some new people and forge a closer bond with a caring group?

Disciple Bible aims to meet both goals.

The Disciple Bible study book covers 34 sessions, 17 Old Testament and 17 New Testament. Rather than ask for a 34 week commitment, this session will cover the Old Testament in 17 sessions. After the 17th session those who wish to continue for 17 more to cover the New Testament can do so. In addition, we will open the group to new members when we start the New Testament study. Disciple Bible is a widely used and proven study course that is noted for its scholarship and impact on the lives of participants. Spiritual growth is a key goal.

This group will also emphasize being a caring covenant group for participants. Following the first, "get to know each other" session, the group will commit to some principles of Bible study, personal sharing, confidentiality and prayer support. Deep friendships can be formed through covenant groups.

The first meeting will be Monday, January 7, 5:30 PM at the church. **Child care is available**. Room location will be announced. Non members are welcome, feel free to invite a friend.

The preliminary plan (subject to change by the group), is to cover the Old Testament in 17 sessions from January 7 through May 13, break for June and July and begin the New Testament study August 5, completing December 2. The group will reopen for the New Testament segment to allow new participants to join.

Spiritual Practices for Today's Disciples Walking a Prayer Trail

This Fall, we have explored different types of "walking prayer." Many people, when they think of prayer, picture themselves seated with their head bowed or someone kneeling with hands folded. By pausing and refocusing our walk, we can be invited by God, through the power of intention, into a time of divine communion.

This month, we will end our series on walking prayer for now by introducing the surprisingly wonderful spiritual discipline of walking a Prayer Trail. If you are someone who has a regular circuit that you walk or run or a favorite path that you enjoy hiking, you can add this practice to your regular walk. To create your own prayer trail, simply mark or make a visual note of several different stops or stations along your route. You might pause first at the bend in the road, sit for a moment on a rock by the waterfall or sit on a bench in the park. Try picking 12-14 stopping places. Then choose what you will read, do or pray at each stop. For example, you might want to work or pray through the 10 commandments or the Beatitudes. Xerox a copy of what you wish to read or mediate upon and carry it with you. Then at each stop, read one section. You might follow that with a prayer or think and meditate on that beatitude or commandment until you reach the next station.

Two different Prayer Trails are being created for you at CLCC: one indoor and one outdoor around the church. This month, you are invited to follow and pray your way to Bethlehem by walking our new indoor Prayer Trail. Twelve different stations will be connected by this new prayer trail. In the Fellowship Hall-- beginning in Advent-- you will find a display that will have a handout containing a map of the Prayer Trail around inside of the church, as well as instructions and suggestions for what you might read or do at "each station". Consider taking thirty minutes and walking this new Prayer Trail or walk three stations on the trail each of the four weeks of Advent until you reach the end/beginning: the birth of Jesus, the Messiah.

In the Spring, an outdoor Prayer Trail around the grounds of the church will be introduced during the Lenten and Easter season.
