A Moment With Our Pastor...

The weather is starting to warm. The Leaves are sprouting across the hardwood canopy. The bugs are awakening, and the daylight is lasting longer now. New *life* is at hand. Resurrection abounds.

We as a congregation are experiencing new life as well. As we are learning to **be** in the ways which keep us on the path Jesus has set in front of us (Be*Love*, Be*Still*, Be*Gentle*, Be*Grace*), we are finding that new life keeps growing and thriving and blessing us all - week-in and week-out.

Our missional identity to Be*Love* is resonating in our surrounding communities and neighborhoods. It is catching on through our Online Sanctuary as well. The word is being spread more and more widely that CLCC is the place to practice our Christian loving.

We are living good news. The harvest is plentiful, but as Jesus once told his disciples, the laborers are few. There is certainly too few Christians in this place proclaiming the gospel of God's loving presence as we have experienced it here at CLCC. I thoroughly believe that God's Love abounds, it is just sometimes hard for folks without a community of faith to see. Life is too challenging, too heartbreaking, too painful at times to remember and notice God's presence all around us. That is why the world needs us to bear witness to Christ-by-our-side.

That is why our mission is more than serving the needy, or fundraising for the hungry, or clothing the naked – our mission is fundamentally to help shift the minds and hearts of all we encounter towards a life in love with the ways of Jesus. Our mission is to grow our congregation so to increase the grace and peace that is known in this place through our Christian witness. Often the method of our ministries are acts of service which help us all to better notice the daily miracles of this life, but the primary goal is always to help folks to envision living into better spiritual versions of themselves. This is the calling to Be*Love*.

In my tenure as Moderator we have said goodbye to our Interim Pastor, Rev. Paul Pryor and welcomed our new Pastor, Rev. Adam Bradley. We are live streaming our 10:55 service, we have a new interactive web-based communication system, *Realm*, installed an updated sound system, and implemented a new marketing campaign. We were also able to acquire a mortgage with a payoff date. Also, before my term expires, we will have a Capital Campaign with hopes of paying our debt down even earlier. These things are huge, but they are not what Cherry Log Christian Church is about.

Cherry Log is about what we do. Cherry Log Christian Church answers Jesus' call to be his hands and feet. The Mobile Classroom is on the road. The Clothes Closet is expanding its mission to *deliver* items to those in need, and we are trying to acquire funds to secure an expanded storage/workspace for this ministry. Volunteers are making at least 100 dresses to be distributed by the mission team going to Kenya again this year. The Garden for Others is getting ready for planting to feed our community. I don't have room here to list all the things that continue to happen at CLCC. I don't have room to imagine what will be happening in our future, but I know it's going to be BIG!

So, as I say goodbye to this position, I am sure I will find something else to do. This place and you people will keep me focused on what is good in this world. Together we can do so much more than we can alone.

Thank you for allowing me to serve.



Capital Campaign - The Path to our Future: Free to Be the Hands and Feet of Christ

Last year, CLCC renegotiated its mortgage with Church Extension, which is a part of the Disciples of Christ denomination. As approved by the CLCC congregation, the renegotiated loan terms for the first time gave CLCC a roadmap to financial freedom. Those loan terms called for CLCC to conduct a capital campaign during the spring-summer of 2019. Early this year, a committee was formed to begin that process. The Core Leadership Team for the Capital Campaign is composed of:

The Chairpersons of the respective committees have and will be enlisting the participation of others within the congregation to assist in carrying out the campaign. With the consultation of Church Extension (which has considerable experience in conducting capital campaigns), we have done significant planning and preparatory work. The campaign will kick off on Sunday, May 12 (Mother's Day) and will culminate with Pledge Sunday, June 16 (Father's Day). More details will be forthcoming as we roll out the campaign.

All of the net proceeds of this campaign (there will be some out of pocket costs attributable to the campaign) will be applied to the PRINCIPAL of the mortgage and a new, lower payment schedule and more favorable payoff date will be set. This campaign thereby presents CLCC with the opportunity to secure its future financial freedom, enabling us to concentrate upon and expand our core missions. Indeed, the slogan for the campaign is: FREE TO BE THE HANDS AND FEET OF CHRIST.

Our goal is to raise \$400,000, payable over three years, so the potential positive impact on CLCC's future is readily apparent. This congregation consistently steps forward to support our missions. The Capital Campaign represents a real opportunity to do so in a way that puts CLCC on the path to even greater outreach. We have every confidence that the congregation will rise to this occasion.

Legacy Partners

In the last issue of the *CherryLogue*, the Legacy Partners advised of a policy change to clarify that end of life gifts could either be directed to the permanent Legacy Fund or go directly to Cherry Log Christian Church with a designation to be used for a particular purpose, like mortgage reduction. That article also include the first four of 15 frequently asked questions (FAQs) about the Legacy Partner Program. Copies of the revised policy and FAQs have been available in the Narthex and will continue to be available this month.

LEGACY PARTNERS FOUNDATION

For this issue we are publishing FAQs #5-8 which provides general information about the Legacy program and Legacy Fund:

How are Legacy Partners recognized?

The church maintains a list of Legacy donors in the Church Library/Conference Room. Each Partner also receives a Legacy Partner Pin. Partners are urged to display their pin as a way to encourage others to participate. Periodically, Legacy Partners are invited to a lunch or dinner to show appreciation and receive helpful planning information.

How many Legacy Partners are there?

As of November 2018, there are 54 Cherry Log Christian Church (CLCC) Legacy Partners. The program was introduced in 2010. CLCC has been recognized by our denomination, in 2017 at the General Assembly, for the rapid growth of our program. Over time this participation indicates our Legacy Fund should attain a meaningful level that will help assure the financial health of the church.

How is the annual income from the Fund spent?

The Legacy Policy specifies how the distribution is spent. 10% will go to the Disciple Mission Fund, 10% toward facility maintenance/improvements, 10% to local outreach, 30% for ministry and 40% toward mortgage reduction.

Why is the spending fixed by policy?

When people commit to an end-of-life gift to the Fund, most want to be sure the distribution from their share of the fund will be used appropriately for the benefit of the church. The current policy uses the annual distribution to benefit the range of uses donors currently support. Being fixed by policy helps assure a donor their gift will continue to broadly support the mission of the church. The policy can be changed if the church's circumstance should change dramatically. The change process is difficult enough to assure broad membership support of the change.

Behind the Scenes: Legacy Partner Member Activity

We gratefully report 2018 unsolicited gifts by some Legacy Partners to our Legacy Partners Foundation account with Christian Church Foundation's Beasley investment account for CLCC's future. Many thanks to Philip Slemons, Sharon Meek, Marsha Kipling and Ida-Anne Clarke.

ADDITIONALLY, in November, two new Legacy Partners (wishing to remain anonymous, and bringing our total membership to 54) also gave a gift to the Cherry Log's LPF account. Although these unanticipated gifts brought our account to top the \$50,000 total required to qualify for an annual distribution to CLCC, the market went south and our account total fell below the minimum required.

Bill Groce undertook updating our Legacy Policy and developing a 15 point explanation of Frequently Asked Questions. These massive tasks bring clarity about common Legacy Partner Foundation fund misunderstandings: specifically the ability of donors to direct their donation to church debt reduction and/or to contribute to future CLCC ministries and growth. This issue of the CherryLogue carries the second of three installments of these FAQs. *Many Thanks Bill. Well done!*

Prayer Labyrinth Walk

Prayer Labyrinth Walk: Saturday, April 20, 1 p.m.

On Holy Saturday, the dark time between the crucifixion on Good Friday and the resurrection on Easter Sunday, we will gather together at 1 p.m. to walk our CLCC prayer labyrinth as a symbolic journey into the darkness of death that precedes the light of new life. At this time, we will reflect on the faithful discipleship of Mary Magdalene, who according to the Gospels



remained with Jesus throughout the time of his death and resurrection. Mary Magdalene was present at the crucifixion (Matt. 27:55-56; Mark 15:40; Luke 23:49; John 19:25) and at the tomb where Jesus was laid for burial (Matt. 27:61; Mark 15:47; Luke 23:55-56.) All four Gospels claim that Mary Magdalene was a witness to the resurrection (Matt. 28:1-10; Mark 16:1-11; Luke 24: 1-11; John 20:1-18.) The Gospel according to John says that it was Mary Magdalene who, following the instructions of Jesus, announced to the other disciples, "I have seen the Lord!" On this basis the early church gave Mary Magdalene the title "Apostle to the Apostles."

Mary Magdalene can serve as model of trust and devotion for us as we participate as faithful disciples in the events of Holy Week. When we walk the labyrinth on Holy Saturday, we will follow her way by maintaining a prayerful presence during this day of darkness that comes before the resurrection of Jesus Christ.
