A Moment With Our Pastor...

Greetings, Church!

As we approach the end of the year, I wanted to look forward to the start of the next one. Now, I know we have a very important season to experience before we get to a new year. But, setting Advent and the Christmas season aside for a moment, lets talk about what 2020 will bring.

As has been our custom since I have come to CLCC, we will have an overarching annual theme for our worship, discernment, and spiritual practices throughout the year. In 2018, we focused on *Gifts of the Spirit* (such as *Inspiration*, *Revelation*, *Wise-Innocence*, *Sabbath*, and *Reconciliation* – to name a few), aiming to understand how God reveals and blesses us through various forms of presence in our midst. This year, in 2019, our focused-theme has been on *Be*-ing, each month a new angle of focus on how the gospel good news calls us to be (Be*Love*, Be*Gentle*, Be*Fearless*, Be*Grateful*...).

The coming year, having now explored numerous ways which God is present with us (2018), and how we are called to be made new in that Holy presence (2019), we will turn our attention to exploring how we <u>act</u> upon God's calling.

The next annual theme in the life of CLCC will be... "2020 Vision: A Missional Journey"

This coming year will be focus on *Vision*. What it means, how it relates to our daily lives, and how we engage in it so to move from where God would have us move. In the process of becoming new-in-Christ, to *Vision* is to seek clarity and purpose in the call God has put on this church.

So, what call has God put on this church, in this time?

That is the question we aim to address in 2020.

In an effort to prepare the ground for the spiritual work that is before us in the coming year, I want to share the broad outline of the 2020 Worship theme. I have given a bit more structure to next year's plan than years past. Added are quarterly sub-themes which I hope will help us to progress through a visioning journey and leave us equipped and motivated to make the difference in this community which God desires. More hope, more joy, more peace, and certainly more love. (*Look to the end of this article for the 2020 Vision: A Mission-al Journey outline*)

I also want to take this opportunity to share with you another adjustment that we will make in 2020. Many will remember that the Worship Committee has sponsored a few "Trial Sundays" over the course of the last year. This is where we have done parts of the worship service differently than is usual for us. The major shift which has been tested is around how we collect the offering.

Installed in the lobby (narthex) are two offering boxes. Come the start of 2020, we will be utilizing the offering boxes on a much more regular basis. This is the plan that has emerged from the Worship Committee, that the first Sunday of each month will be (*informally*) "Offering Sunday." That is to say, on the first week of the month we will pass the offering trays as is our current practice and we will hear a testimony (offering meditation) from a church member which is tied in with that month's worship theme. For the subsequent weeks of the month we will invite offering to be given through the offering boxes and will *not* have an offering meditation during the worship service.

Let me outline some of the motivating factors of this decision.

- 1. <u>Hospitality</u>. For many visitors, being asked for money each and every time they come to visit us is off -putting and can reinforce the notion that churches are really just all about money. For many who struggle financially, the plate passing them without being able to put anything in it is a weekly reminder of their struggle not their hope. For those who give monthly, quarterly, or annually, the weekly ask is unnecessary and can also bring up worries about what others might assume by them letting a plate pass without giving.
 - The passing of the plate can be an anxiety-producing event in the midst of worship, for a number of reasons, and worship should <u>not</u> give you anxiety.
- 2. <u>Flexibility</u>. There is a balance to be attained in how we use our worship time most impactfully. If services are too long, we get distracted and move our attention away from God. If services are too formulaic, without having creative surprises and delights (special music, testimonies, and liturgical art...etc), worship can become mundane and we can miss the miracle at hand. By freeing up the time spent weekly on collecting offering, we make room to add more novelty and richness to our services.
- 3. <u>Intent</u>. What are the theological implications of soliciting an offering every week? Should the church have to ask, week in and week out, for its participants to give generously? Or do we think that gifts, tithes, and offerings are a response to God's grace? If the latter is true, then (*I believe*) we can trust our people to be faithful givers without the regular ask of a weekly offertory meditation, while also better reflecting the ways of God by offering a *passive* invitation to give.

It is my hope and prayer that the congregation will embrace this change regarding the collection of the offering. And, that this small shift might be good practice for how we will grow into the future. I am certain we will all be better served by learning to be more flexible and accommodating to those who are coming behind us. And if this change is nothing else, let it be an opportunity to practice *grace*.

Jesus tells us the great commissioning is to make Disciples. For the first time in our nation's history, there are more "unaffiliated" people than those who claim any regular religious practice. There are lots of reasons for this, yet the outcome is that we live in a social context which leaves Disciple-making a very difficult mission. Yet, it is our mission none the same – share the loving word of Christ and invite others into relationship with God.

Sometimes changes can be uncomfortable, but if we are not responsive to the needs of the day, our unwavering traditions can be a hinderance to the greater goal of Disciple-making. We are moving towards an exciting year of vision, moving with the Spirit, and I am eager to see what God is doing here!
